Play it for your kitties....we have seen this work magic quite effectively on all our felines.



# **Safety**

#### **Nutrition**

Rule of thumb is that a commercial raw diet is best, grain-free wet with simple ingredients is second best, and the cheapest wet food on the market is still better than the fanciest brand of dry food. Cats are obligate carnivores, meaning that they need meat to survive. We recommend 75-100 percent wet food.

#### Keep these important tips in mind:

\*Feed your cat meals rather than free feeding (see why in the video below). Cats do not need to graze. <u>Video on Feeding Cats Meals</u>

\*<u>Avoid dry food</u> (it should be a snack or treat, not a meal)

\*Note that cats will almost always choose dry food when available. It's coated in something very delicious (and gross). Just because a cat "likes dry food better" does not mean that they need it. They are creatures of habit and in time will acclimate to most foods with some patience. Think about a child and candy. They might choose to eat it for every meal if they could, but it doesn't mean it's the right thing to do.

\*Quality food might cost more in the moment, but it will save you in vet bills brought on by the effects of obesity, kidney disease, urinary issues, digestive issues, and allergies (all linked to dry food consumption).

\*A well-hydrated cat will drink very little water, if any. If your cat is on an all-wet diet and does not drink, don't worry! That's perfectly normal. They are getting their hydration from the food. **A cat is already quite dehydrated by the time they seek out the water bowl.** 

To avoid, if possible: foods that include added salt, carrageenan, grains

**Treats** can be a slippery slope. They are not typically needed, and the recommended serving portions on the bag are unreasonable. Consider skipping altogether, using a dental treat just for special occasions, or using a freeze dried single protein meat, broken into tiny pieces or a wet treat like Churu or Tiki sticks. Dry treats used often will cause obesity and are very habit forming.

Feeding time for kittens: 4ish times per day, as much quantity of wet food as they want! Kittens eat a lot. Take note of their cues. As they get older, you will want to follow portion sizes more carefully.

Feeding adult cats: 2-4 times per day (3x is ideal). Cats do better with regular meal times, like humans, rather than grazing all day (see this short video).

Cats do not react well to sudden changes in their diet, but keeping some variety as a regular part of their meal routine (mix in novel proteins like rabbit, lamb, venison, and duck) can be very good for them and will be helpful if you ever need to change their food.

# Play & Toys

Toys to use only with caution (and must be put away):
